The system supports teaching, learning, research, curriculum development, teacher education, and educational policy through integrated access

to print, digital, and multimedia resources.

In addition to its core academic and information services, the NCERT Library System plays a significant role in the development of school libraries and the professional growth of school librarians across India. Background Paper — NCSL 2026

School libraries are fundamental to the realization of quality education and the development of lifelong learners.

Once regarded as repositories of books, contemporary school libraries have become dynamic learning environments that encourage literacy, inquiry, creativity, critical thinking, and collaboration. NEP 2020 recognizes libraries as integral to the educational ecosystem and calls for vibrant school library systems that cultivate reading habits, strengthen foundational literacy and numeracy, promote multilingualism, ensure equitable access to quality learning resources, and leverage technology for learning.

In today's knowledge society, learners require not only literacy but also information, media, digital and, increasingly, AI literacy. Libraries are the spaces where students learn to locate, evaluate,

create, and ethically use information — while advancing constitutional values, civic engagement, cultural heritage, and the Sustainable Development Goals, thereby contributing to nation-building.

Building on the National Conference on School Libraries (NCSL) 2025, NCSL 2026 deepens the national discourse on the role of school libraries in advancing NEP 2020 — focusing on policy perspectives and evidence-based case studies, and bringing together policymakers, educators, teacher-librarians, researchers, administrators, and technology experts to reimagine libraries as vibrant, inclusive, technology-enabled, and learner-centred spaces.

Paper Submission Guidelines

Interested school librarians, professionals, research scholars, administrators, policymakers, and academics are invited to submit full-text research papers with a plagiarism report to ncsl.ncert@gmail.com:

LANGUAGE

Papers may be submitted in English or Hindi.

LENGTH

Between 2,500 and 4,000 words (maximum).

ABSTRACT

A concise abstract of 250 words (maximum) with 3 to 5 keywords.

FORMATTING

Times New Roman; 12 pt body; headings 14 pt bold; title 16 pt bold; single line spacing.

CITATION STYLE

References must conform to the APA Style Manual (7th Edition).

AUTHOR DETAILS

Title (Dr./Mr./Ms.), full name, institutional affiliation, and email of all authors.

PLAGIARISM POLICY

All papers must be plagiarism-free and compliant with the UGC Guidelines (2018).

Note: All submitted papers will undergo review by a panel of subject experts. Accepted papers will be published in the conference proceedings with an ISBN.

Travel, Registration & Accommodation

NCERT will extend travel allowance (TA) support to approximately 100 paper presenters/participants in accordance with NCERT norms.

TRAVEL ALLOWANCE

- **Eligibility for Travel Allowance:** TA will be provided only to the first author whose paper is accepted for presentation at the conference.
- **Decision-Making Authority:** Financial assistance shall be at the discretion of the Committee constituted, as per the rules framed for this purpose.
- **Priority Criteria:** Preference will be given to library professionals affiliated with school libraries from outside Delhi and the NCR for travel grant.
- **Author Limit:** Travel allowance will be provided to only the first author per accepted paper.

REIMBURSEMENT CONDITIONS

- Travel allowance is limited to Third AC train fare or bus fare, upon production of valid travel tickets.
- Tickets must be booked through authorized sources (IRCTC, M/s Balmer Lawrie and Company, M/s Ashok Travels and Tours) to be eligible for reimbursement under NCERT norms.
- TA reimbursement will be made via online bank transfer; participants must provide their bank name, account number, and IFSC code.

REGISTRATION & PARTICIPATION

The participants, including co-authors and general attendees, who are interested in attending the conference, are required to pay the registration fee. The registration fee includes the conference kit, meals, and a certificate. The details of the registration fee will be made available to participants through the conference website:
